raised in Pittsburgh where she began her education journey at a young age. In 1975 she graduated from Seton Hill University in Greensburg, majoring in English, and minoring in French, received her bachelor's degree in English and immediately began teaching. She started by teaching high school in Pittsburgh but wanted to move up to something more. She went back to school for her certifications and decided to begin working towards a Masters in English. She achieved her M.A. degree at Carnegie Mellon University while she was still

teaching high school.

Even though her Masters took her quite some time, she decided to begin to work towards her Doctorate. She decided to keep learning with the intention of gaining more knowledge for the sake of her students. While working on her Doctorate, she decided to go back to her alma mater, Seton Hill, to continue working while working towards her Doctorate. She earned her Doctorate from Duquesne University.

She taught at Seton Hill for several years before moving on to Kutztown

University in Reading, Philadelphia, before moving to back to the Pittsburgh area where she began teaching at Thiel College in 1999. She recounts her love for teaching English, focusing on writing and literature.

When asked if there was a turning point in her life as to when she knew she was supposed to be a teacher, she told a story about being 3 years old in her shed in the backyard with her chalk and blackboard, playing teacher. She had coke bottles as her students, which she would give names too, using her imagination and teaching them whatever she could think of. Even though she took other jobs in college, she always came back to

teaching. She is rare in a sense of always knowing that she was supposed to be teaching. She learned discipline and organization after teaching elementary her first year which she says wasn't a good experience, but she learned a lot from it.

In her interview, she mentioned the importance of extracurriculars at the high school and college level. She tells about being in charge of the newspaper and yearbook. She stressed the importance of students working in and outside of the classroom and taking on leadership roles.

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Unionization: First Starbucks, Now Apple

Between Starbucks and Apple companies, the growing need to unionize is becoming prevalent in the US.

Starbucks

On Thursday, February 10, 2022, in New York City, The Workers Union revealed that five separate site's worth of petitions had been filed. There was also a letter of support signed by 76 New York officials from the Service Employees International Union that came forward in order to speak against anti-unionization efforts, and to advocate for worker's rights.

Starbucks employee Sam LaGow said in an emailed statement from Workers United, "Every workplace in America should be democratized, and it's within our power to make that happen."

The company's North America president, Rosann Williams, wrote in December that "we do not want a union between us as partners [store workers]," but that the company respects the legal process and would bargain in good faith at the first store where the union won.

These unionization efforts are being made to specifically address staffing shortage issues, and to advocate for better wages. These efforts are being made even after ...

Decision Made in Kim Potter Trial

Feb. 18th, 2022: Kim Potter, a former Minneapolis police officer, has been sentenced to two years in prison for the death of Daunte Wright.

On April 11th, 2021, Potter, an officer for Brooklyn Center, and her partner pulled over Wright for expired tags and an air freshener hanging from his mirror. After realizing that there was a warrant out for the arrest of Wright, the officers attempted to detain him, where Wright stepped back into his car. As he was driving away,

Potter says she mistakenly pulled out her handgun, yelled "Taser," and shot Wright fatally, where he drove for a few blocks before crashing into another car. He was pronounced dead on scene.

In December of 2021, Potter was convicted with first-and-second degree murder. Two months later, she has been charged and sentenced 16-months in prison with the rest on parole.

Judge Regina Chu, the judge of the case, released a statement calling it one of the "saddest cases

[she's] had on her 20 years on the bench." Regarding Potter's sentencing, she said, "On the one hand, a young man was killed and on the other, a respected 26-year veteran police officer made a tragic error by pulling her handgun instead of her taser."

When the conviction first made news, a mugshot with Potter smiling was released, angering Wright's family. Between the mugshot and sentencing, Wright's mother, Katie Wright, feels that the justice system has failed her and her son. "Today, the justice system murdered him all over again," she said, adding an

accusation that the judge was taken in by "white tears," as Potter cried during her statement before the sentencing.

The trial was extremely emotional for Wright as she sat through, awaiting the fate of the woman who shot her son. "She never once said his name, and for that, I'll never be able to forgive you. And I'll never be able to forgive you for what you've stolen from us."

Potter apologized to the Wright family, stating, ...

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Thiel Students and Faculty Nominated for National Broadcasting Awards

Feb. 11th, 2022: Thiel communications students and faculty members have been nominated for a total of eight awards for the Intercollegiate Broadcasting System Awards.

Four students and members of the departments of Communications, Media, and Public Relations at Thiel College have been nominated for eight awards for the 82nd Intercollegiate Broadcasting System Awards.

Students from both TCTV and WXTC, the television and radio broadcasting stations, have been nominated for their work within the stations.

Jacob Orczeck '22 and Samantha DiBucci '23 have been nominated through TCTV. Orczeck was nominated for Best Program Promotion for his promo "Gross Indecency." DiBucci was nominated for two awards, Best Station Promo, and Best Variety Program.

"I was very excited to find out I was nominated for two awards. It came as a

huge surprise, honestly. I think both pieces I made were fine, but I did not realize that they were on this level of good," DiBucci said.

WXTC had four students, Ethan Stishan '22, John Ganear '22, and Orczeck, as well as faculty member Peg Watts, receive nominations for their work.

Stishan received a nomination for Best Stage Manager. Ganear gathered two nominations, one for Best Business Director and Best Newscast, while Orczeck gathered his second with Best Production Manager. Watts was nominated for Best Faculty Advisor.

These Thiel students will be competing against a diverse pool of nominees. There is a wide range of different types of schools, including small private schools and large public schools. Institutions like the University of Kansas, Temple University, and more are being represented through their student nominees.

Ethan Stishan said that he is excited about this opportunity.

"I can't even lie to you, I cried whenever I found out. It was just a recognition that all the hard work everyone has put forward is paying off. It's awesome to be recognized for it." He said regarding his nomination.

Stishan also paid homage to Watts. "Our old station advisor Peg Watts got me into the Radio in the Spring of 2019, pulling me in through the Radio Broadcasting class. And she saw something that, as a Mathematics major (and a Data Analysis major now), I didn't think was possible. Without Peg pushing me to be the station manager since I took over in the Fall of 2020, my college experience would've drastically changed."

There's hope on the horizon for gold medalists at the conference. "I have fairly high hopes for myself, and the others nominated this year. We have won before, so why not again?" DiBucci said.

While both Stishan and DiBucci have hopes of winning, they both are

grateful for the opportunity. "Obviously, when you're nominated for one of these awards, you're hoping to win it. But even being nominated in itself is just simply amazing. To be recognized as one of the top college radio station managers in the country shows that even at a small college like Thiel, you still can-do big things," Stishan said and continued to express hope for future students. "I'm hoping this award, and all the other awards we've been nominated for, not only encourages the future staff and DJs at WXTTC, but the surrounding community of Thiel College and Greenville, to always put their best foot forward, no matter what they're doing."

The conference is being hosted virtually this year due to the Covid-19 pandemic. It will happen on March 5th via Zoom.

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Los Angeles Rams Win Super Bowl LVI

INGLEWOOD, Calif. -- —The Los Angeles captured their first Lombardi Trophy in L.A. and their second in franchise history, off the back of a stellar defense and game-winning drive.

The Los Angeles Rams and Cincinnati Bengals faced off in a close-matched Super Bowl that came down to the wire. Both defenses held off each other's offense throughout the game with the Rams edging out the Bengals after a game-winning drive and 4th down stop on the final possession.

The discussion going into the game was mostly focused on the offense.

On the offensive side, there was Quarterback Matthew Stafford who was traded to L.A. during the off-season. Stafford came into the Super Bowl with his first three playoff wins coming from this season. The main target for the Rams, Cooper Kupp, had a breakout season and captured the NFL's receiving triple crown. For Cincinnati, the

talk was all about quarterback Joe Burrow who is just in his second season and has turned around the team. Burrow led the Bengals to their first playoff victory in 31 years.

First Quarter:

The game began with a 17-yard Odell Beckham Jr. touchdown catch to put L.A. up 7-0. Neither team would score until Cincinnati broke through with 00:28 seconds left in the quarter. Bengals kicker Evan McPherson, who has been a huge help in the playoffs, booted a 29-yard field goal to end the quarter only down by 4. END OF QUARTER: LAR-7 CIN-3

Second Quarter:

Following suit of the first quarter the Rams struck first. Cooper Kupp caught an 11-yard touchdown from quarterback Matthew Stafford. Los Angeles missed the extra point after a botched hold and incomplete pass attempt by punter Johnny Hecker. Cincinnati would not go down quietly into half and scored their first touchdown of the game on a 6-yard pass thrown by their

running back Joe Mixon. The touchdown was caught by Cincinnati's Tee Higgins. END OF QUARTER: LAR-13 CIN-10

Halftime:

The Pepsi Halftime show was one to be remembered. The show featured multiple 90's and early 2000's rappers. The group included Snoop Dogg, Dr. Dre, Eminem, Mary J. Blige, Kendrick Lamar, and a surprise appearance by 50 Cent.

Third Quarter:

The Bengals came into the third quarter locked and loaded, scoring on their first play of the offense. The touchdown was another catch (75-yards) by Tee Higgins, but this time thrown by Joe Burrow. The Bengals added to their lead with another McPherson field goal (38-yards). The Rams finally got onto the board with a Gay field

goal from 41-yards out. END OF QUARTER: LAR-16 CIN-20

Fourth Quarter:

A back and forth defensive battle was waged into the fourth quarter. The Rams finally broke the chain when Cincinnati gave up multiple defensive penalties in their own territory. Cooper Kupp would find the endzone and give the Rams the go-ahead score.

FINAL: LAR-23 CIN-20

Stafford finished 26-40, with 283 yards and 3 touchdown passes. Copper Kupp finished with 8 catches for 92 yards and 2 touchdowns. Kupp was named the Game's Most Valuable Player (MVP).

This is the Ram's second title in franchise history, winning their first as the St. Louis Rams in 1999.

Junior Destiny Johnson scored a game-best 18 points, corralled five rebounds, along with two blocks and two steals. Senior Colleen Trainer had a season-high 13 points, four rebounds, and two steals. Freshman Lexy Wagner scored 12 points, along with three, three-pointers, four rebounds and two steals, and junior Destiny Merriwether grabbed a career and game-high 12 rebounds. The Bearcats were led by senior Taylor Geer and Ella Marconi that scored 13 and 11 points, respectively. Geer grabbed 10 rebounds and had five assists as well. Thiel heads into the postseason as the eighth seed and will head to ninth-seeded Waynesburg University Monday night for their win or go home matchup.

The Thiel Men's Basketball team earned their fifth consecutive win with their senior day victory over the Bearcats. The game began with both teams going back and forth, with Saint Vincent leading Thiel 17-11 with 11:17 left in the first half. The Tomcats rallied back with an 18-2 run, giving them a 29-19 lead. Heading into the half, the Thiel lead 41-30 and refused to let the Bearcats get any closer the rest of the game. A few minutes into the second half, the Tomcats began a 15-0 run, giving them a 66-39 lead with 8:40 left in the game.

Thiel never gave up their lead and continued to add to it, propelling them to a 33-point senior day victory. The smothering Thiel defense wreaked havoc for the Bearcats offense, as the Tomcats scored 26 points off turnovers. Five Tomcats scored in double digits led by Junior Beni Lavodrama scoring 15, Aarestrup (12), Marlon Ellerbee (11), Ethan Barnes (10), and Rayshod Hooper with, as well. Tejumola led Thiel with nine rebounds, Junior Marlon Ellerbee also with a leading stat of four assists, and Ethan Barnes recorded a team-high three steals. The Tomcats hold the sixth seed in the PAC postseason standings and will head to the third seed Westminster College on Tuesday night at 8 p.m. Thiel hopes to continue their end of the season five-game win streak momentum as they head into postseason play.

The Future of Netflix:

All of Us Are Dead, Squid Game, The Platform, etc.

Netflix was at the front lines of streaming entertainment directly into your homes. With Netflix’s success, many other companies like Disney, HBO, and many television networks have jumped on the trend of streaming movies and tv shows from the comfort of your home.

However, Netflix is still one of the top streaming platforms among the rest of them. Why? Netflix is broad and different.

Services like Disney+ allow you can get a huge catalog of Disney, Pixar, Star Wars, and Marvel movies and shows. They even allow you, for a fee, to get the brand-new movies that come out in the theaters. This approach is great, especially with the time we are in, but the idea of paying a monthly subscription then another fee on top of that to watch a movie is a little too much.

Services like Hulu give you even more of a selection that is similar to television and is cheaper than both Netflix and Disney+. However, there are still

advertisements. It some- times is nice to go grab a snack but sometimes feel out of place in a streaming service.

Netflix, although the standard plan costs \$16, gives the most without being too intrusive with ads. It is more than Disney+ and Hulu’s “Standard” versions but I believe it is worth the extra cost.

The content Netflix has is very broad and original. While there are shows and movies you probably have seen a thousand times, they have a bunch of shows and movies that seem very different.

Another popular series recently came out, All of Us are Dead. It came out in late January and became Netflix’s third-watched show of the whole week. This Korean drama follows the events of a zombie outbreak from the point of view of school children.

While it sounds elementary, this show threw classic zombie tropes out the window and gave a very grounded approach to this type of show. Each character had major development and made you empathize with them on this adventure.

This is what makes Netflix different from the rest. They are able to bring in different creators from all over the world to make content that is different from the norm. And on top of having major action movies with celebrities like Dwayne “The Rock” Johnson and Ryan Reynolds. Netflix makes the price more so there can be more amazing content in their catalog.

Apple has tens of thousands of retail workers in the United States alone. The company itself has been financially thriving in recent years, bringing in \$378 billion this past year, a huge increase compared to even the 2017 numbers of \$240 billion. Apple has been reportedly putting this income towards stock buybacks and dividends for investors.

Retail employees have not been feeling as much of this impressive income as this impressive income as top tier company employees and investors have. When interviewed by the Washington Post, employees have reported that their wages have not been

going up with inflation, even if their original pay was well above the minimum wage of \$17 to \$30 dollars an hour. While these rates are never regionally low, most other companies in any given region are not nearly as wealthy as Apple, which is valued at \$3 trillion.

“I have a lot of co-workers and friends who I genuinely love and they do not make enough to get by,” said one labor organizer who works as an Apple retailer. “They’re struggling and they’re hurting and we work for a company that has the resources to make sure that they’re taken care of.”



Nintendo Shutting Down the Shop

February 15th: Nintendo announced that they are shutting down the shop for Wii-U and the 3DS, but this won’t be happening till around late spring 2023. This, however, is not happening all at once; they are shutting the shop down in sections. First, May 23, 2022: It will no longer be possible to add funds using a credit card to a 3DS/Wii U eShop account. Next, August 29, 2022: It will no longer be possible to use an eShop card to add funds.

However, it will still be possible to redeem download codes. Finally, Late March 2023: It will no longer be possible to make purchases, download demos or themes, redeem a download code, or add funds. The reason why this is happening is because, “This is part of the natural lifecycle for any product line as it becomes less used by consumers over time,” said Nintendo. This was bound to happen due to both the Wii-U and the 3DS are older systems

being around a decade old.

Although the shop is shutting down consumers can still redownload games, update the system, and play online. The issue is that consumers will no longer be able to buy games digitally. Consumers will be losing around 1800 games, also Nintendo saying, "currently have no plans to offer classic content in other ways."

This is like when Sony shut down the store for the PS Vita, which is the portable PlayStation and the PlayStation 3, but “in a remarkable reversal, though, Sony ultimately decided to keep the stores open, with CEO Jim Ryan saying that it was "clear that we made the wrong decision here.”

We will see with time if Nintendo will stay on the same route or be like Sony and reverse their decision.

“Katie, I understand a mother’s love. I’m sorry I broke your heart... my heart is broken and devastated for all of you.”

The mother of Wright’s son, Chyna Whitaker, says that her son will never get opportunities with his real father. She said that Wright will never get the chance to throw a ball around with him or see him go to school. “My son shouldn’t have to wear a ‘rest in peace’ shirt with his dad on it.”

The attorney for the Wright family, Ben Crump, has said that he is in awe of the sentence. He cited a case from 2017, black officer Mohamed Noor killed a white woman, Justine Ruszczyk

Diamond, after she banged on their police car and raised her right hand.

Noor believed Diamon to be a threat. Noor received a 57-month sentencing, something that Noor brought up. He said that he didn’t understand the difference in consideration when the situation was similar, but races reversed. “What we see today is the legal system in black and white,” Crump said.

Potter’s short sentencing has raised concerns over the justice system. For a defendant with no history of a criminal record, the state guidelines for first-degree manslaughter ranges from slightly over six years to around eight and half years. Potter only received two years, raising red flags for many.

“His life mattered, and that life was taken,” said Prosecutor Matt Frank. “His name is Daunte Wright. We have to say his name. He was not just a driver. He was a human being. A life.”
